FROM THE NHLS CHAIR

It only seems a short time since August when we were able at last to hold our Annual General Meeting and I was appointed as your Chair, but what a busy time it as been.

In September we held our very first Charity event at Rotherfield Estate in Hampshire by kind permission of the Scott family. Hedgelayers from all round the country turned out to raise the fantastic amount of £14,500 for three charities: RABI and the two South West Air Ambulances. 120 cutters attended; what a brilliant effort for a first event. We hope to do it all over again on the $1^{\rm st}$ October 2022 at the same venue.



Then, in last October, again at Rotherfield, we were able to hold our National Championship which Covid had forced to be held over from the previous year. The hedge proved to be more of a challenge than some we have had but with a little extra time given and a nice dry day the standard that the cutters put before the judges was of the highest. Very well done to all those who competed. Glyn Davies cutting Welsh Style took the new "Reserve Supreme Champion" trophy whilst Peter Gibson, cutting Lancashire and Westmorland style, took the overall Supreme Champion title. Well done to everyone who took part whether you were winners or not. At this point 1 have to say a big thank you to our chief steward Clive Bethell for organising both of these events.

At the National Championship we announced two new projects: one a partnership with the Dry Stone Walling Association to form the "Rural Skills Hub", the second to launch the new accreditation scheme under the LANTRA banner. This is open to anyone whether they are members of the National hedgelaying Society or not. Application forms can be downloaded from the NHLS website or on request from our secretary.

In November we organised our patron's event with 30 cutters tackling a blackthorn hedge at Highgrove. The Prince of Wales duly arrived and spoke to every cutter in turn as he walked the length of the hedge. A very enjoyable day it was, and the Prince seemed to really enjoy himself in such a relaxed atmosphere.

The NHLS and it's officials continue to look at ways to move the Society forward in these changing times and hope to have more announcements for you in the very near future.

I'd like to add a personal "thank you" to all volunteers who give their time so freely to help with the running of this Society.

FABULOUS NEW MEMBERSHIP PAYMENT METHOD!

As from last autumn, Andrew Crow and I have been working with the Society's accountants on an online accounting package that will simplify the accounts and, ultimately, the processing of your membership every year.

The part of the process that will affect you, as a member, is the convenience and ease of being able to set up a direct debit online. Once set up it will enable us to send you an invoice as a reminder and the subscription will then be taken automatically. I shall send out invoices at least 2 weeks before renewal date to enable you to alter anything.

An advantage of GoCardless, as the direct debit program is called, is that it is a once only process for the member, once in place that's it, done. The NHLS has no access to your personal banking details. It can also be used for ad hoc payments such as merchandise, meaning that you will be able to pay directly rather than having to send a cheque or transferring the money. The only thing to remember is to cancel any standing orders that are in place. We cannot do this for you as we have no way of knowing who is paying by standing order or by bank transfer.

NEW NHLS CHAINSAW TRAINING AWARDS

The National Hedgelaying Society recognises that chainsaws are in many cases an essential hedgelaying tool. It also recognises that it is a tool which is dangerous in untrained hands. We therefore encourage all chainsaw users to undergo training in the safe use of chainsaws. Indeed, you will not be permitted to compete in The National Hedgelaying Championship without a current recognised training certificate.

We also recognise that gaining these qualifications is not cheap for young people commencing life in land-based work therefore, in recognition of the importance we place on the issue of safety and our desire to encourage more young people and those looking to make a career change, to practise the craft of hedgelaying, the National Hedgelaying Society is offering an award of £100 to persons of 40 years of age and younger (minimum 16 years of age) who present evidence of having successfully completed a chainsaw maintenance and cross cutting course, either 003920 City & Guilds Level 2 Certificate of Competence in Chainsaw Maintenance and Cross-cutting or Lantra Level 2 Award in Chainsaw Maintenance and Cross-cutting.

To be eligible for this award, the applicant must be a member of the NHLS and, if not a "Junior" member, must be paying their annual subscription by direct debit or have arranged to do so by completing a direct debit mandate for their forthcoming subscription.

The chainsaw course can be taken with any approved Lantra or City & Guilds training provider.

The funding allocated to this award scheme is finite and the allocation will be on a 'first come first served basis'. For further details visit the NHLS website.

The National Hedgelaying Society is a charity registered in England and Wales and is unable to make awards to persons living outside these countries.

To Whom It May Concern;

As a long standing member of the NHLS and an active competitor in the Midland Open Class; after long deliberation and serious discussion with fellow members and cutters; I feel I have a duty to voice our concerns over the future of our Midland Open Class.

Myself, and fellow highly principled and passionate Midland style cutters, are very concerned that the fore-mentioned class may become compromised, due to the unfortunate excessive and seemingly flagrant use of deadwood within our class competitions.

We realise that deadwood is a contentious issue, but this subject needs to be appropriately addressed and serious debate needs to take place within the society to secure the future of the Midlands style going forward.

If the continued and seemingly accepted practice of the overuse of deadwood is allowed to continue without consequence and guidance for our competitors and judges alike, the difficult task of securing further landowners to offer hedgerows for future competitions will become increasingly difficult to obtain.

Decisions over how clear the rules and regulations are, including deductible points and disqualification need to be made.

The Midland style (also called the Bullock hedge) should be a living, stock-proof barrier. How is this possible, with long swathes of dead hedgerow in the following weeks after a competition has taken place?

The art of laying a living hedge is being lost.

We cut Midland style for a living and speak to many landowners in the course of a season and all too often we hear that the landowner would never contemplate a competition on their land, solely due to the issue of deadwood. This is because long after the competitors have triumphantly left holding their winning cup aloft, the farmer is left seeing how much of his hedge is not growing the following spring.

I hope, going forward we can bring some much needed reform to our rule book to help competitors and judges keep Midland style alive.

Looking forward to hearing from you in the near future.

HEDGELAYING AND THE ENVIRONMENT.

May I fully endorse the comments made by George Darwall in the Summer 2021 Newsletter; it is right that standards need to be maintained by some form of "accreditation" but that is not to say it is only for those who see hedgelaying as a source of income, there is far more to the craft than crashing down as much hedge as possible in a season, and I have met many, (shall we call them "Volunteers" rather than "Amateurs), who know more about hedgelaying and the environment than some of those who claim to be professionals.

It is my belief that we need to give far more consideration to what is being laid and why. How many Hedgelayers do environmental surveys (as well as risk assessments), before beginning their work? Yet laying a hedge can be very disruptive to the flora and fauna, even destructive. The ecology of a hedge could be irreversible damage by destroying some unrecognised habitat essential to a rare plant or insect.

Climate change is another aspect of hedgelaying which seems to have received little attention. Should we be looking at the "Carbon Footprint" of hedgelaying activities, minimising the amount of material cut from the hedge and ensuring that it is disposed of thoughtfully, and what about the use of electric chain saws?

Perhaps the NHLS should be publishing recommendations and guidelines for "best practice". I believe that Hedgelaying must change drastically over the next few years; it is no longer about retaining livestock in a field; the future is much more about careful management of hedgerows and the landscape. Preserving the past, in the form of ensuring that the old skills, techniques and styles continue to be used, but also protecting the future, by making sure that everything we do is environmentally friendly.

So, come on Hedgelayers, let us have a debate about hedgelaying and how it can best serve our environmental needs. If we do not get it right now there will not be a future for hedgelaying.

THANKS

To the National Hedgelaying Society,

It was a total surprise at the AGM to be made a Life Member. Thank you all involved for putting me forward.

Where does the time go? I well remember my first day hedgelaying at Manor Farm on a light hedge between FARM PIECE and PECKET PIECE, I did so enjoy being taught by KEN HOPE, I went on to lay all the hedges on both farms, some really rough ones.

Never to be forgotten, the boundary hedge in COW GROUND (why it's called that I never know, not a good field, ridge & furrow in 5 different directions) a rough hedge, 6 foot ditch, no chainsaw, 5lb axe, bill hook and transistor radio. It was a Sunday, radio on and The Beatles had just released their new record "Penny Lane & Strawberry Fields". Wow what a mega day!

By laying these rough hedges I learnt so much. The first competition I saw was the Forest of Arden ploughing & hedgelaying competition – I realized "I could do that". I entered the 53rd Sheepy Ploughing & Hedgelaying Association on 13th October 1966 at Moor Burgess Farm, Glascote, Tamworth...

...off I set in my blue Ford Poplar van having milked the cows beforehand. It rained all day.

The Open won by Bert Clark, 2nd Roy Hawkins, 3rd Mr J Grewcock

Under-25 won by Ron Clark, 2nd myself, 3rd R Grewcock

What fun. I won £6, a lot of money, when my wage at home was £2, 10 shillings a week.

I went home happy, then milked the cows again.

What was sad was the site we laid the hedge on, the following week it was turned into a building site for houses.

I only competed in one Farmers Weekly competition at Offchurch in 1967, as I was expected to milk morning and night; I didn't have a relief until 1973.

I did a lot of contract hedgelaying between milkings, until the farm doubled in size. Only competing in competitions from 1966 – 1975 but then again 1986-87-88 and then in our local hedgelaying and walling competitions, great fun.

I had the honour and pleasure to become chairman of the NHLS in 2005, a role I enjoyed. I do so enjoy judging now, started in 1998 and I have enjoyed co-judging with many great hedgelayers.

I have so enjoyed the camaraderie of all associated with hedgelaying and the countryside.

THE CONTINUING PERILS OF BLACKTHORN

1 am a hedgelayer and on Friday 19th March 2021 I fell awkwardly while laying a hedge and a blackthorn penetrated my left calf muscle.





By the time I reached home my calf muscle was very swollen and red and it was very painful. As I am very aware of the danger of blackthorn poisoning I went to Witney hospital where I was given an anti-tetanus injection and

antibiotics. The staff were unable to extract the blackthorn as it was so deep and told me that the Ultrasound Department at the John Radcliffe Hospital would contact me within 24 hours. If they did not do so 1 should call them. As 1 did not receive a call 1 contacted them and was given an appointment on Tuesday $23^{\rm rd}$ March at 9.15 a.m.

Two people performed the ultrasound examination and told me there was no thorn to be seen.

As my calf muscle was still very painful I went home and applied a veterinary poultice and renewed it twice a day. On Saturday 27th March a 15mm blackthorn came out of my calf (see photos enclosed).

I am writing to you as I feel hedgelayers everywhere should know that an ultrasound scan is not completely reliable. It failed to show the blackthorn that was still lodged in my calf at the time.

2021 IRELAND HEDGELAYING CHAMPIONSHIP Nigel Adams

n early October Phil Hart and I were invited to go over to Ireland to attend their annual hedgelaying championships. Myself to judge and Phil to do a demonstration of the South of England style. Due to shortage of time on both our parts we decided to fly over to Dublin from Gatwick leaving our cars at Cilla Tunk's house close by. It was great to see Cilla and have a quick cup of tea and a chat before taking a taxi to the airport.

We were met at Dublin by Mark, a long standing member of the society and someone we had met before in events in France and The Netherlands, who drove us about 90 minutes to the site in County Offal so we could get a look at the site.

Soon we found ourselves marking out the plots either side of a potentially rather wet farm track (it was on top of a peat bog!), novices one side and professionals the other. The hedge was really tough, big old Hawthorn planted in a single line and stems often far apart. One side was easier than the other so we made that the novice section and the older stuff for the more experienced. As darkness fell a delicious meal was served up in the marquee by the farmer's wife for those who had spent the day setting up the event.

After dinner a few beers were served up, a special brew made for the event called 'Hedgeslayer'! We also chatted about the day to follow. Ireland does not as such have a recognised style so judging was not so straightforward. I learnt that some would be adding binders others not. So just how should the judging could be carried out...I decided that I would mark on cutting, build and general appearance only, excluding binders, yet have a special stand-alone prize for best binders and all agreed that was the way forward.

The weather held out for the event day and early on craft stands and vintage agricultural dis-



plays started to arrive. Competitors were not quite so punctual and it was about 10.30 before they finally started to cut.

Standards varied enormously but on the whole they did very well on a difficult hedge. Visitors were plentiful including the Environment Minister from Dublin who was very interested in hedgerows. At the end of the day and after quite a bit of deliberation I chose my top three in each class and soon the prize giving was under way.

On the Sunday we travelled into Dublin for an informal meeting with the Irish Hedgelay-

A truly magical day was shared by those who attended this years Patron's event.



BHHA "SKILLS OF THE HILLS" 2021

Great God - What people hedgelayers are!

The Blackdown Hills Hedge Association held their Covid-delayed "Skills of the Hills" hedge-laying competition on 2nd October 2021 in the village of Hemyock – right in the heart of the Blackdown Hills. Our host, Mrs Jenny Parsons, was as welcoming as she was patient, the competition having been postponed a couple of times for various reasons.

Despite a plethora of local knowledge, we were unaware that October seems to be the start of the monsoon season on this part of the Devon/Somerset borders. The weather forecast for the day was truly dreadful, a consistent "black cloud and two raindrops" from start time until dusk. Add into the equation the fact that the legendary "Mobile Catering Division" of the Smeatharpe WI had ceased trading during the pandemic and we looked at each other on the morning and said "no one will turn up".

Well, they did, and in their droves. Out of a field of 36 competitors, only 2 chose not to take part. And when they did arrive the atmosphere was like a party - it was reminiscent of old black and white footage of pit ponies being let out into the fresh air after a six week shift underground. All classes had a classic Devon bank to work on, with the majority of the pleachers between waist and shoulder height.

Despite the conditions most cutters had finished before the closing hooter, and arrived at the food marquee in soggy dribs and drabs. Most of the tent sides had been removed for Covid ventilation reasons, but at least the roof stayed on, and gave some respite to those wishing to wring out chainsaw trousers and undergarments.

The BHHA has always prided itself on the catering at its event and the absence of the WI could potentially have caused a problem - but not a bit of it. Dawn Vickery, Lynda Cregan, and Lindsay Graham stepped in and produced a vast cold buffet, hot drinks and cakes. Even the plague of locusts that is your usual hedgelaying competition field, couldn't finish it despite earnest endeavour. All those involved should be congratulated on what they achieved. The inclusion of Steve McCulloch's mum's runner bean chutney, means that the BHHA may well now be able to hang on to its Michelin star for another year.

Along with the catering staff, the judges and stewards should all be thanked for turning out in excellent conditions for field testing the new waterproof paper scoresheets! I'm not sure we would have had any comprehensible results without it. So thanks to Roger Vickery, Roger Parris, Don Gaskins, Alan Barlett, Ian Connabeer, Henry Selway, & Charlie Burrough for their stoicism.


